Goals.	<p>To expand the geographical scope of partnerships through:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -Identifying Regional Umbrella organisations and follow a top down-approach to assess ongoing projects and programmes. -Identify projects for replication. -Define terms of partnerships (technical, financial and policy development).
Outputs.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> -Better understanding of regional view of land accessibility for food security. -Increase number of partners- to include grass root organisations and CBOs. -Broaden knowledge dispersal and information dissemination.
Social, economic, environmental Impacts	<p>Socially: Women empowerment in policy and decision-making would promote social all-inclusion, as well as increase access to support services.</p> <p>Environmentally: Appropriate and a more sustainable mechanised farming techniques will be used instead of traditional and rudimentary farming systems, thus conserve land and save the environment.</p> <p>Economically: Through civil initiatives, communal land holding can be promoted by encouraging co-operative societies. Thus, a long-term investment of time and resources can be initiated. This would enable farmers to provide collateral security for financial support for meaningful agricultural projects.</p>
